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## Councilmen Mum On Union Threat

It's hard to find one quiet politician. Santa Cruz, however, is blessed with several of them.

The members of the city council are adamantly mum on the threatened union affiliation of city employes over a wage dispute

Councilmen Ernest Wicklund and Richard Werner are out of town and unavailable for comment.

"Mayor Samuel Leask III will say only that city employes "have the right to talk to anyone they want to" in reference to next Wednesday's meeting of the workers with union organizers.

Councilman Norman Walters says he doesn't want to talk until he has spoken with the employes. Councilman Ray Goodrich and Councilwoman Lorette Wood both said they agreed with Leask's comment and would not add to it.

Councilman Eugene Fleming did elaborate to some extent:

"I'm in no position to tell the city employes the right and proper direction they should go for their own benefit," he stated. "I definitely feel that the council, in my years of experience, has dealt fairly with the employes and has assumed them to be a definite and won-

derful asset to the community.

"I'm sure that in the future we will . . . maintain the best possible relationship with the best salaries available on the basis of the city's economy.

"I would very definitely hate to see the relationship between the council and employes split through any action that union affiliation might induce."

A summit meeting has been set tomorrow between employes' association leaders and top city administrators. No specific time or place has been scheduled, and it is reported the talk will

be an informal one.

Meanwhile, the meeting be-

tween the employes and organizers for AFL-CIO and the Teamsters has been slated at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the civic auditorium.

Employes salary committee C hair man Kenneth Doler stated he believes a majority of city employes is now in favor of union affiliation. He reported that salary is the big issue in the dispute; there are no other major grievances.

Employes' association President Sam Gaub said he thinks most employes don't actually want to join a union, but feel they are being forced into the move.
