Downtown Association celebrates 50 years Clubs + organizations succes Gala Saturday at ittenhouse Building

SANTA CRUZ — Trula and Neil Hickman spent two decades commuting to San Jose to work in the printing business until the opportunity to buy Sentinel Printers in downtown Santa Cruz arose two-and-a-half years ago.

"We jumped at the chance," said Trula Hickman, 49, thankful for loyal customers when the economy went south. There is a lot of support for locally owned businesses."

She didn't realize until this week that Sentinel Printers is the oldest operating business downtown. It opened in 1856.

Chip, the Downtown Association director who goes by one name, has been researching how many businesses have been downtown for 50 ears for a Saturday gala celebrating the association's 50th anniversary.

The task is tougher than first meets the eye.


Judy Steen, who edited a new version of "The Sidewalk Companion to Santa Cruz Architecture," researched the oldest businesses in Santa Cruz County 15 years ago.

"It drove me crazy," she confessed.

For example, Marini's started in 1915 on the Boardwalk selling saltwater taffy. It opened a store downtown later.

Paper Vision, the stationery store, is an offshoot of Paper Vision Press, started by the owner of Plaza Books. but Steen traces the history of that shop to 1915 when A. B. Carr operated it under a different name.

Then there's the Santa Cruz

Hotel, built in 1877, where many years later the upstairs is home to Red Restaurant and Bar.

In any case, Chip estimates there are about 20 downtown businesses that have reached or passed the half-century mark.

Last year, about 300 people attended a Downtown Association gala marking the 20th anniversary of the earthquake, which shook up the downtown landscape.

The association presented an award named for John Lişher, a leader in post-quake rebuilding, to his widow Juleen and Ceil Cirillo, who headed the city's redevelopment agency at that time.

The party was so enjoyable

organizers decided to bring it back, according to Linnaea Holgers James, who worked for the Lishers for 17 years at Artisans Gallery then bought the business last year.

"It's a chance to get together and celebrate downtown,' James said.
