WATSONVILLE - The 19th annual Watsonville Strawberry Festival at Monterey Bay promises to be one sweet event.



ebrate something so important to Watsonville, not just economically," said Israel Tirado, a city Parks and Community Services recreation supervisor. "I don't think anyone in Watsonville doesn't love to eat strawberries. They're the freshest in the world here, and Watsonville as a community takes pride in that and this event tries to showcase that.'

Watsonville is home to the California Strawberry Commission for good reason. Strawberries are Santa Cruz County's premier crop, valued at almost \$200 million in 2011. Thousands of acres of the sweet red fruit surround the city, and industry heavyweights such as Driscoll's are in the neighborhood.

Growers have donated 11 pallets of fresh strawberries to the event. More than a dozen nonprofit agencies will benefit from the bounty as they turn the fruit into

fundraising treats.

carnival, set up on Main Tirado said an expanded Street between Second

Street and Riverside Drive. The Berry-Go-Round and other tame rides will be back to please the younger set, but some new attractions are being added for teens.

"I'm not promising the Giant Dipper," he said, referring to the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk's historic roller coaster. "But the rides will be a little more thrilling, a little more scary."

Main Street will be closed from East Beach to Riverside Drive, along with Peck Street, Maple Street and Second Street.

Parking is available at the Civic Plaza garage on Rodriguez Street, a half block east of Second Street. The \$5 fee benefits Watsonville police and fire cadet programs.
