Bogard Construction of Santa Cruz to finish \$16.5 million project next year

SANTACRUZ » A \$16.5 million addition and remodel is underway at Sutter Maternity & Surgery Center, the first expansion since the specialty hospital at 2900 Chanticleer Ave. was completed in 1996.

The project, financed by Sutter Health, is slated to be complete in October 2015.
