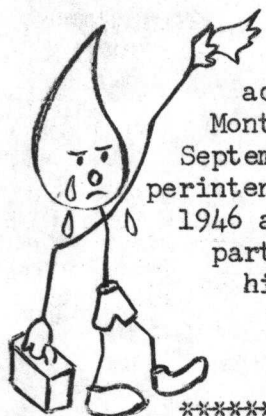
GREETINGS AND SALUTATIONS

GROUP AUTO INSURANCE TO BE PRESENTED TO THE EMPLOYEES

Delegates to the last League conference showed great interest in the report of Insurance Chairman A. D. Strayer, who presented the points to consider in the selection of a company to provide group auto insurance for Association members.

Thorough investigation and analysis on plans offered by a number of companies was made, and the committee has come up with a recommendation which has been accepted unanimously by the executive Board.

Transport Indemnity Company was the final selection because it offered the soundest proposition backed by a record of fair adjustments and most attractive rates which assure members worthwhile savings. Comparisons of rates of about 100 policies held by Glendale Employees indicate savings of 17% to 35%.

A unique feature of the company's plan is that the insured acts as his or her own adjuster and payments are made monthly at no increase in rate. This and many other advantages will be explained in detail by League Chairman Strayer and officials of the Transport Indemnity Company. Arrangements will be made to have the plan presented at one of our regular meetings. Strayer recently stated that the Group Auto Insurance program was progressing and that they now have about 250 policies in force and hope to have 500 in the near future.
