Adventist fellowship gathers for annual camp meeting

SOQUEL — After being bustled between numerous foster homes and winding his way through the bureaucratic child services maze, Justin Vert, now a youth evangelist, finds heartbreak when the people he solicits give his cherished Bible back.


"It makes me sad that some people don't know God's love," explained 18-year-old Vert, speaking over evangelist Shawn Boonstra's speech. "When people give the book back I always ask them if they are sure, because it could be their last chance to accept God into their hearts."

Vert looked past his Seventh-Day Adventist comrades and beyond the throngs of trailers, tents and cars sitting on the 89acre Adventist-owned Soquel property, and produced a wide, unbridled smile.

"God's love is more everlasting, infinite, pure and uplifting than anything else I have ever known," said Vert with assurance

It's that dedication that has drawn more than 10,000 people to the Central California Conference of the Seventh-Day Adventists in Soquel over the last 10 days. They've come to renew their faith, learn more about their religion, spend time with friends and family and enjoy the weather.

"This is a family gathering," said Ramiro Cano, vice president of the Central Coast Administration of Adventists. "The fellowship likes to get away from their day-to-day routines. This event is a time

where we as leaders are able to cast the vision of the church and give updates about where we are."

With headquarters in Clovis, the Seventh-Day Adventist provide, for a fee, camping, food, and education for their camp meeting that concludes today. The alcohol- and smoke-free event is open to the public and focuses on spiritual renewal, according to Cano.

"Life is pretty tough without the Lord," said Cano. "But, life is awesome when you have faith, hope and peace. People come here to learn about God."

## 'Up to par'

"I come here every year and always learn something new," said Les Redell, a third-generation Adventist. "Adventism is believing in every word of the Bible. When you start becoming a practicing Adventist, you just don't waver because there aren't other religions that are this up to par with the Scripture."

Equipped with their own Christian market, Adventist book store, security and emergency fire and medical vehicles, the camp meeting is self-contained.

In between sermons, health seminars and family counseling are available. The seminar "Good Sex Doesn't Just Happen" tutors married couples on the art of sex and sexuality.

"We want to promote healthful living, diet and lifestyle," said Cano. "There are a lot of training programs about family, parenting and sustaining healthy marriages."

This year marked the 126th camp meeting for the Seventh-Day Adventist of Central California. Included in


