A trim little Cessna 182 floated deftly down the long black runway amid the thick pine forests of the Empire Grade yesterday afternoon and Bonny Doon Vil-lage airport became an official

reality.

ficials and aviation enthusiasts came to the dedication. Ten planes flew up to the 2000-foot high air-port to add proper perspective to the ceremony.

eral store. Land has been provided along the skirt of the airport for private dwellings. Nichols said they would be particularly suited for persons commuting from the bay area by plane. The whole project takes in some 40 acres.
