
SANTA CRUZ YESTERDAYS



QUAINT CHURCH MARKS SOQUEL

Soquel has been called the "old ome town" which lives in every home traveler's dreams but which seldom exists in reality.

Rich in history and old in years, the neighboring community is no longer the sleeping village it used to be, yet it is intensely proud of the quaint little church that has served its faithful for so long.

Soquel Congregational church was built 85 years ago on land given by Joshua Parrish in 1869.

at Soquel landing (now Capitola) In 1868 the people of Soquel invited the state of California to invited the state of California to move its capital there. The building offered had been erected by the town band, a vigorous organization of the day. Later their hall was purchased, moved to a different location and became a Methodist church. This Methodist group later united with the Santa Cruz church.
