Plans call for the study to be financed by a zone tax. The tax would be 25 cents per \$100 assessed valuation the first year and

20 cents the second year. Elmer D'Angelo and Patrick Creegan, district engineers, re-Creegan, district engineers, reviewed the preliminary report and answered questions. One of the main purposes for the formation of a water zone would be to make the necessary studies for an engineering report which would recneering report which would rec-ommend the best source of ade-quate water supply to serve the area, they said.
