Hillside Challenge

A narrow, steep site, preservation of redwood trees, and the desire for as much outdoor living as possible dictated the design of the Stephen Titus home at 617 Cathedral Drive, Aptos.

The house will be included. on the Cabrillo Guild of Music's house and garden tour June 19. It is one of five homes and gardens to be on display to the public from 1-5 p.m. Tickets at \$5 each are available from Cabrillo College Community Services, 425-6331.

The Titus home was featured in House Beautiful's Building Manual of 1976 Spring-Summer.

Architect-owner Stephen Titus, AIA, found it necessary to go up instead of out, resulting in a 20 by 20-foot structure that contains four

levels of space.

The house is constructed on a pole foundation that supports the four levels, and partitions were omitted in order to create a free spatial flow that visually enlarges the areas.

The downhill side of the house is extensively glazed, because that is the view side. A variety of decks also expand the visual and physical dimensions of the house. Large open space on the main level contains areas for cooking, dining and living and entryway.

Interesting details on the

house include plexi-glass bubbles in the middle bedroom, which gather sunlight that is refracted as it passes through. The master bedroom is secluded among the treetops at tol level of


the house.

The house sits at an angle on the property in order to dissolve any feeling of nar-rowness, and presents two mostly opaque walls to neighbors, leaving the other two walls windowed to look out on the forested slope across a creek.

Titus, who is associated with Ellmore-Titus of Santa Cruz, also worked with a tight budget of \$25,000 and wanted to provide a garden and parking area. SANTA CRUZ SENTINEL 6-17-76

Guitarist Andy Zieldan and Flutist Caroline Williamson will be featured at the Ken Recker home in Santa Cruz.




