which was to open this month.

No one is sure now when it will open. Barry Samuel, director of the county Department of Parks, Open Space and Cultural Services, said he couldn't give an estimate.

"All sorts of people can't wait to get in it, and we can't wait to open it." Samuel said. "We don't

know the answer." The 11,000-square-foot swim center sports four pools, including a warm-water pool for aerobics. an Olympic-size pool, a wading pool and a 120-
