Racial Minority Groups Plan For Mass S.F. Demonstration

San Francisco (P).—Racial minrity groups stuck by plans today of mass 2000 demonstrators Satrday at showrooms on automorile row to back demands for inreased minority hiring.

Mayor John F. Shelley's comrittee on human relations workrd to get the dispute off the creets and around a negotiating able.

Already more than 300 demon
Strators, including actor Sterling Hayden, have been arrested in two previous Saturday sit-ins on automobile row. They await trials in municipal courts behind 162 how being tried in groups of 10 for sit-ins at the Palace Hotel over the same hiring issue.

Legal minds say the procedure — massed sit-ins, arrests and demands for individual trials—could tie up the courts for months.

Prior to Saturday's massive

Part of the preliminaries was washed out to sea today, but a full-rigged, formal dedication ceremony for the Santa Cruz small craft harbor will go off as scheduled to-

morrow morning.

The Great Golden Fleet, The Great Golden Fleet, San Francisco's ceremonial flo-tilla, canceled its trip to Santa Cruz, bottled up in San Francisco bay by high winds and breakers running up to 14 feet. The Coast Guard cutter "Wash" also can-celed its planned appearance here.

Coast Guard Rear Admiral Allen Winbeck, who was to arrive with the San Francisco boats, will drive here tomorrow morning instead. San Francisco Mayor John Shelley, also scheduled to be a fleet passenger, will not attend the dedication.

Tonight's dinner by the Santa Cruz Yacht Club will proceed as planned, with a social hour starting at 6:30 at the Dream Inn, for the other officials and dignitaries arriving for the dedication.

Major General William Cassidy and Brigadier General Arthur Frye are expected to attend. General Cassidy, commander of the army engineer school and engineer center, will be the main speaker at tomorrow's ceremony. General Frye is division engineer at San Francisco.

A crowd of a thousand or more is expected for the dedication, which will start at 9:30 a.m. at the harbor. Don Falconer, port district commissioner, said final dedication plans were being completed today.

"We have had excellent co-

"We have had excellent cooperation from the highway patrol, the sheriff's office and the police department in making plans to accommodate the crowds," Falconer said. "We expect traffic to flow smoothly in and around the harbor during the day." He asked the public to help by arriving at the harbor in time to avoid congestion.
