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

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Cornerstone Of New Church Is Placed

The cornerstone of the new Congregational church building at 900 High street was officially layed amid much ceremony and with numerous church leaders participating yesterday afternoon.

The structure, which is costing roughly \$450,000, is scheduled for completion sometime next December.

Rev. Bernard J. Corneliussen, pastor at the church, gave the benediction and numerous other church leaders gave talks and participated in the ceremony.

A trumpet fanfare by Lyle Laverty of Branciforte Junior high opened the ceremony and was followed by the invocation delivered by Rev. Oliver Aubrey, a lay member of the church.

Melvyn E. Pratt, assistant moderator of the Santa Clara county association of First Congregationalist churches, read appropriate scriptures pertaining to the importance of the cornerstone ceremony.
