Harvey West **Presents More** Land To City

Harvey West has purchased 6.5 acres of land to provide a link between Harvey West municipal park and the idyllic Wagner grove picnic The annot area.

grove picnic area.

The announcement was made today by the city parks and recreation department.

West completed the purchase from Gay Young last week. This was done with the intent to connect the existing facilities for a complete community park.

West, a native of Soquel, is owner of the Placerville Lumber company.

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His benefaction to the Santa Cruz parks program includes donation of the present 21.5-acre park in 1954, cash contributions toward the swimming pool, and donation of the colorful tribe of wooden Indians which populate the children's playground.

West also presented the sevenacre Wagner grove to he city in January, 1958. In an isolated canyon south of the main park, it contains be a u t i f u l redwood stands, bay trees, hiking trails and barbecue and picnic facilities. West purchased the property, used as a community recreation area since before the turn of the century, from the heirs of John Wagner.

L. A. Crow company of Alameda is winding up its \$145, 000 site preparation contract. Contractor George W. Davis of Watsonville already has moved into the campus grounds above Soquel drive to start "phase two" — four classroom buildings, water, sewer and gas systems.

Bids for the final three phases will be let by September. The 130-acre campus is to open for fall semester 1962.

Two massive sewer districts are interlacing the Mid-County lowland areas. Contractor Ernest Pestana of San Jose has completed the \$1.5 million basic phase of the East Cliff sanitation district. Fisher Contracting company is installing a \$1 million collection system to round out the \$2.3 million Aptos shnitation district.
