But Mayor Mike Rotkin said Monday that he didn't believe the council would support that move, and if the association backed away then the city simply would get antique holdsaid

council would support that move, and if the association backed away then the city simply would get another sponsor and continue holding it downtown.

On Tuesday, members of the association's board of directors heeded the mayor's suggestion that the group would be better off continuing its sponsorship, but they were not pleased with his comments.

"That's paternalistic as hell to pat us on the heads and say, 'It's going to be there whether you like it or not,' " said board member John Lisher. "He's just one vote on the council. He doesn't have that kind of power."

Rotkin said after the meeting that the council would seriously consider the association's proposal. The mayor did not rule out the benchlands, although he was concerned about access and the city's consideration of the site for a \$150,000 skateboard park

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Association members made it clear, however, that even if the council turns thumbs down on the benchlands site, the market would not continue in the Lincoln Street

benchlands site, the market would not continue in the Lincoln Street area after mid-July.

Embattled merchants in that area were promised that the market would be relocated, and the association leaders wanted to make sure that promise was honored.

Board member Jim Mullen said the park location was "perfect," despite his objections to having to make the move because of Rotkin's intention to "jam it down our throats, anyway."
