

# Supervisors Censure Students

SANTA CRUZ — Students who disrupted the University of California Board of Regents meeting here two weeks ago were censured by the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors today.

The board, by a split vote, passed a resolution that the "small minority" of students and faculty who caused the turmoil be dismissed immediately.

Chairman John McCallie and Supervisor Henry Mello voted

against the measure, saying it was not the board's prerogative to interfere in a university matter.

"I question whether a local government should try to dictate the policies of the university," said Mello.

Supervisor Thomas Black, who introduced the motion, said he felt the board would be shirking its duty by not taking a stand on the matter.

"I think we have a very definite interest in this matter," said Black, noting that the board a short time before had approved about \$1,000 in overtime for county employees put on emergency standby during the two days of demonstrations.

The sheriff's 30-member riot squad and county hospital staff members were placed on standby alert.

In addition, Santa Cruz police department and the California Highway Patrol had units standing by.

None of the standby personnel were used.

During the demonstrations students jeered and cursed the regents, including Gov. Ronald Reagan.

Supervisors Vincent Locatelli and Robert Burton supported Black's motion.

Burton, who said he helped draft the resolution, said he showed it to university officials here and they did not object to it.

The resolution made clear that a small minority of local students and faculty were involved in the turmoil that several times disrupted the regents' meeting.

McCallie said, "I don't for a minute condone some of the things that happened."

But, McCallie said, the board shouldn't get itself tangled in a university affair.

McCallie said he felt most of the trouble was caused by outside agitators.

Students from other U.C. campuses and a number of non-students were known to be on the campus, university officials reported.

McCallie said he felt the local students did their best to try to keep things under control.
