ITUATED on world-famous Monterey Bay, 74 miles south of San Francisco and 374 miles northwest of Los Angeles. It is destined to become one of the major coastal communities in California, presently growing at an unsurpassed rate. Construction of University of California campus, together with the opening of new Small Craft Harbor and rapid industrial growth will double the area's population in the next decade.

Privately owned Sky Park Airport 4 miles from Santa Cruz. Six franchised truck carriers. Contract carriers available. Taxi service.
