
## Regents Give Final Approval To College Three At UCSC

plans for the university campus at Santa Cruz, Dedication ceremonies at 4:30 p.m. today will be preceded by a public survey of the site beginning at 3:30 p.m. Main entrance to the campus is on High street, just beyond the Bay street intersection. During the dedication ceremonies, UC President Clark Kerr will present a bronze plaque commemorating the occasion to former regent Gerald H. Hagar, who will set it in place on a large boulder.

The regents are here for the site dedication ceremonies today.

College three will cost \$3.6 million and will stress science. The first two colleges, previously approved but not vet built. will stress social sciences and humanities.

The college will be a group of low buildings with classroom accommodations for 500 students. Some 350 will be housed at the college with some of its faculty and the rest will be commuters.

Architect is Ernest J. Kump Associates of Palo Alto.

Also at yesterday's meeting the regents received a plan for land surrounding the campus.

The plan assures them that the city and county will carefully control developments so that no undesirable or unsightly activity may spring up beside the campus.


Normally, Santa Cruz might expect 12,000 to 14,000 new residents by 1975 to add to its present population of 27,000.
