

Hospital Name Changed

Board Eases Patient Rules

SALINAS — Monterey County Supervisors Tuesday officially changed the Monterey County Hospital into a community hospital.

In addition to changing the name to "Community Hospital of Monterey County" supervisors passed an ordinance which:

- Allows patients to be treated by their private physicians. Previously patients were treated by whichever doctor was on duty.
- Changes priority of accepting patients, emphasizing medical need rather than lack of ability to pay.
- Removes three-year state and one-year county residency requirements.

The action was taken to bring the county hospital in line with the federal medicare program.

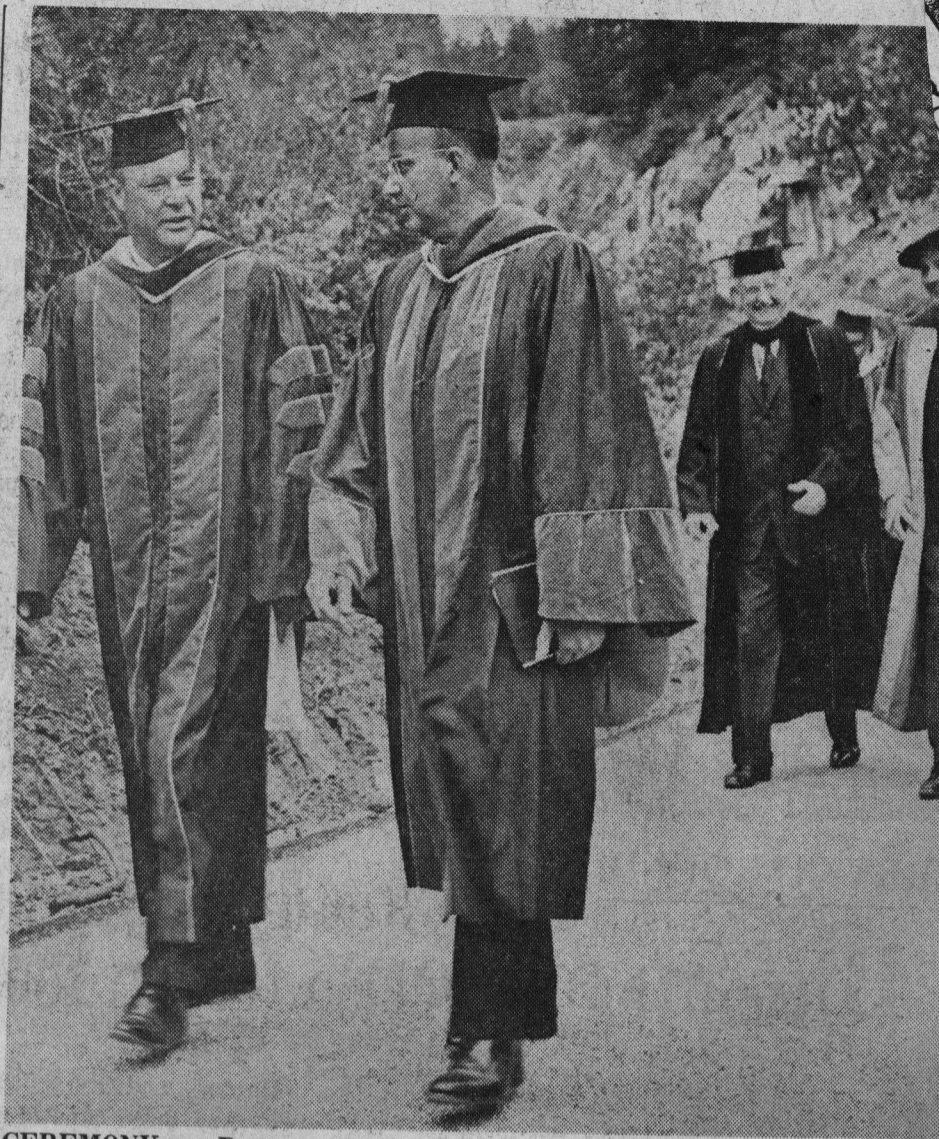
Supervisors passed the ordinance over the objections of County Counsel William Stoffers.

Stoffers said he had no legal objections.

"I don't approve of the changes but you're running the county, not me," he said.

The county counsel pointed to elimination of residency requirements, saying the county would still receive some indigent patients. He indicated the residency requirements should be retained for them.

Stoffers also objected to changes in priority. Again he said he had no legal objections.

McHenry Is Inaugurated -- After Two Years On Job

SANTA CRUZ — Facing a sea of 2,000 faces and flanked by sheer limestone cliffs, Dean E.

McHenry Tuesday officially became University of California at Santa Cruz' first chancellor. The inauguration ceremony was held in an abandoned quar-

ry in the heart of the 2,000-acre campus which, McHenry in his inauguration address said, is indicative of the "many years of rawness and growing pains ahead" for the new campus.

"The resemblances are not merely physical, however, for the ideas and ideals that guide the Santa Cruz campus are like those of Jefferson's young republic," said McHenry.

Dignitaries from throughout the state attended the ceremony, which also commemorated the 98th Charter Anniversary of the University of California.

Lord Murray of Newhaven, main speaker for the affair, said the new campus here may well set a pattern to change the academic format of education.

"Great universities throughout the world are keeping an eye on what happens here," said Lord Murray.

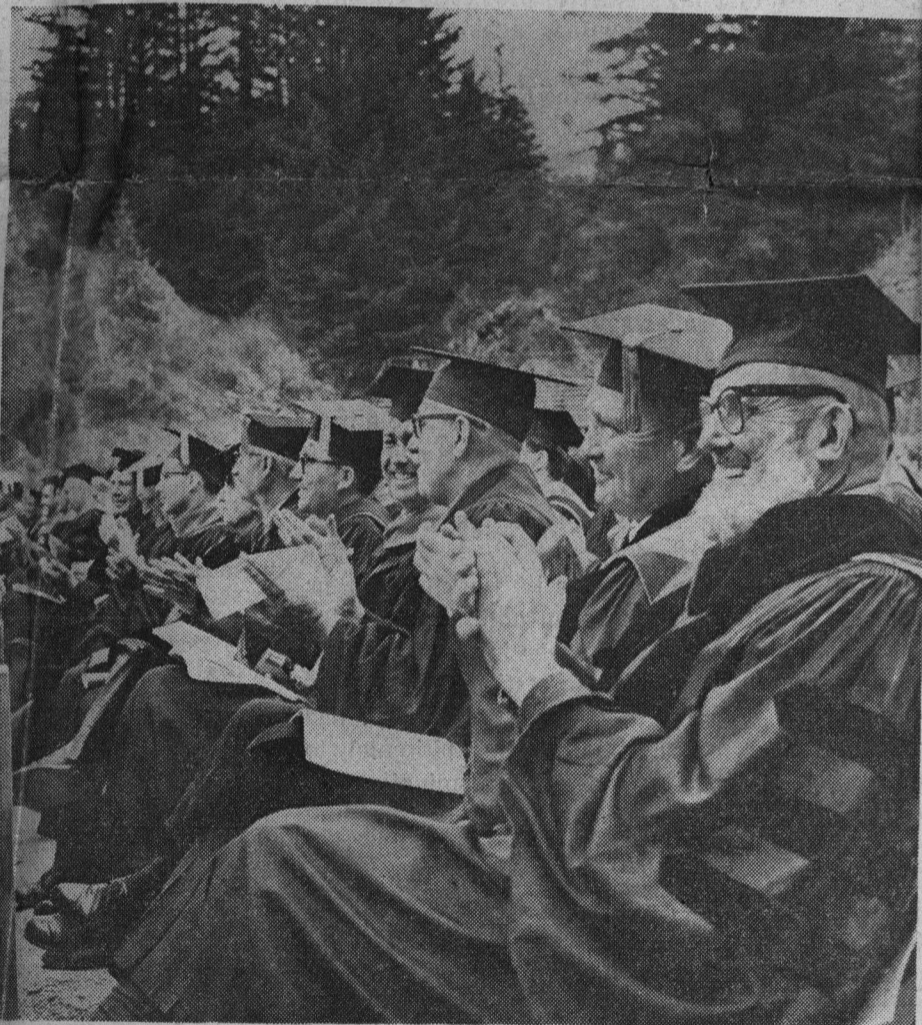
As acting chancellor the past two years, McHenry has conceived an educational innovation which he says will enable the Santa Cruz campus to "grow smaller as it grows bigger."

The plan calls for building about 20 smaller colleges around a campus "core," which will have such centrally used facilities as libraries and science and research centers that all students can use.

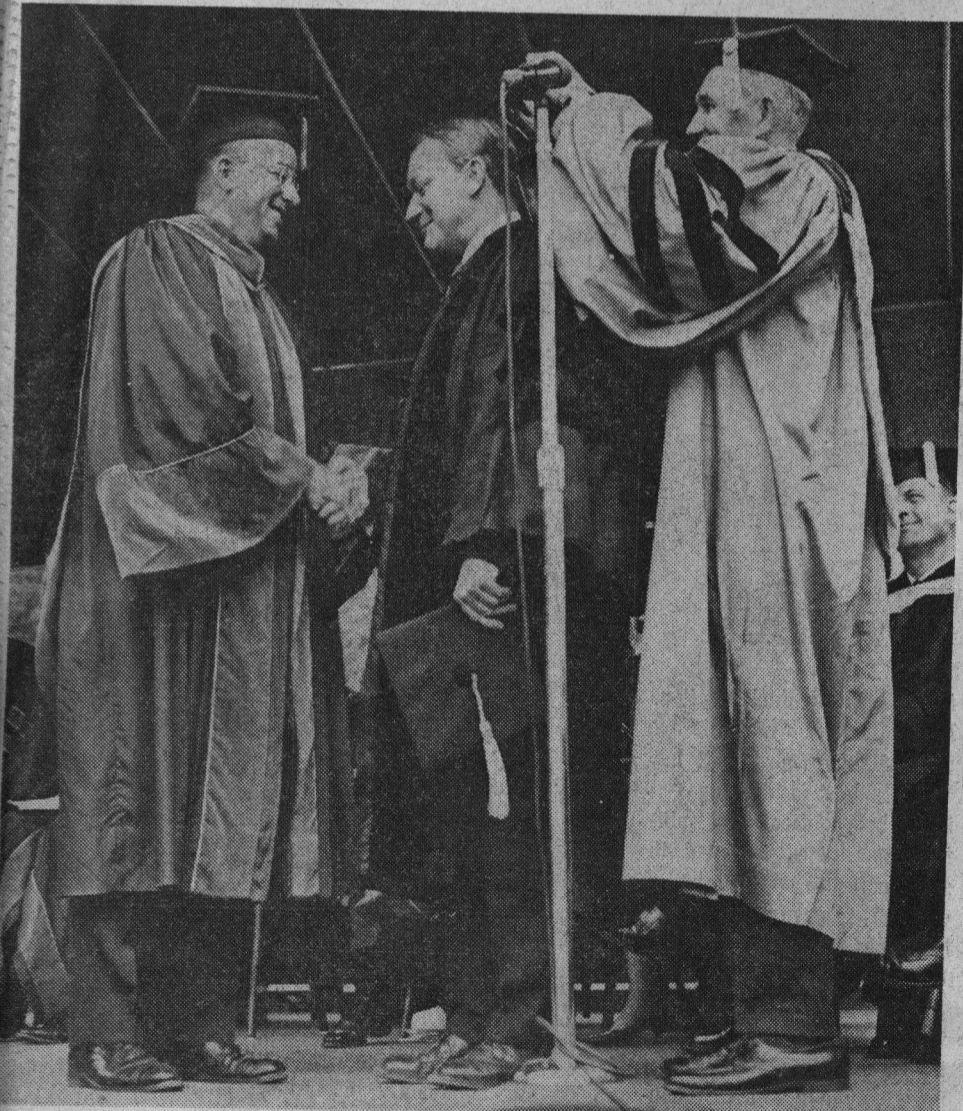
Representatives of 57 universities, colleges, and academic societies — all in academic cap and gowns — took part in McHenry's inauguration march. It was led by University President Clark Kerr.

Santa Cruz Board Awards Hospital Addition Contract

SANTA CRUZ — A contract lower than even the firm had anticipated. It contained a \$39,000 error, he said.
