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WATSONVILLE While the Watsonville-Santa Cruz chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League is in a rural setting, it is one of the larg- +100th est in the nation.

That was one fact Mas Hashimoto highlighted recently during a celebration marking the chapter's 80 years in Santa Cruz County.

With more than 90 people in attendance, the four long tables were filled for

Tokushige Kizuka Hall on Blackburn Street in Watsonville.

"We're doing this one because four of our members have reached their birthdays," Hashimoto, former chapter president. "So we're celebrating their contributions."

Hashimoto recounted the storied history of the chapter to event attendees. He touched on key points, from the chapter's beginnings as a social club

the celebration at JACL formed by the first generation of Japanese immigrants in the county in the 1930s to years of inactivity in the 1940s because of the government incarceration Japanese-Americans during World War II.

> "It is difficult to explain 80 years of history in a few minutes," he said. "Our chapter today, thanks to its members and board of directors, is one of the largest in the entire JACL and one of the most proactive."

Also part of the celebration was recognizing four 100-year-old members of the chapter: Dr. Masako Miura, Hiroko Shikuma, Enji Shikuma and Nancy Iwami.

"I think the people that started it, they really worked hard and did so much for us," said Iwami. who was there with her daughter and granddaugh-

She also acknowledged the league's efforts to help members with getting reparations from the government in the wake of the internment.
