
A true team effort

But the excitement was possibly most palpable at firehouses throughout the Aptos/La Selva Fire Protection District, said Ryan Peters, a firefighter-para-

"We have three people on duty at each station and all the stations were watching," he said. "Even those who were offduty were calling in saying, 'Did you see that?' "

"These guys don't give up," Aptos manager Dave Anderson said. "It's the most amazing thing. They always believe."

Moments like these, where true heart wins out, is what the Little League World Series is all about. The thrilling moments just kept coming as Aptos battled Clemmons, N.C., the Southeast representative in the tournament.

Aptos showed its resilient side in securing an 11-8 win, and new life following Saturday's

loss to Louisville.

"It really was a team effort," added Anderson, apologizing for using the cliché. "McCauley gets pounded, and he has a major headache, but be comes back. There is no one star on this team. Everyone is involved."

And afterward, as the players trotted from their barracks to meet with their families, the

cheers went up again.

The Aptos rooting section has been badly out-cheered so far in this tournament, mostly because they just don't have the huge numbers of some other teams. The Southeast group's chant reverberated through Little League Volunteer Stadium for much of Sunday's game.

But after the fireworks in the fourth, when Aptos was mounting its huge comeback, what was once a faint "Aptos, Aptos, Aptos," roared into a symphony and the folks from North

Carolina could not hang.

As it turned out, neither could their team. The scrappy Aptos squad scratched and clawed, and as Anderson said, even got pounded on in this game. Nevertheless, they still managed to emerge smiling with a satisfying win and ready for one more game—at least.

While Godoy and Biancardi are the most visible heroes of this win, for their home runs were truly remarkable, it's McCauley who exemplifies what Little League Baseball, what sports, should be about.

"I felt I needed to help my team," McCauley said after the game, licking his various wounds. "I needed to go out there and do the

best I could."

Besides, Tyler Raymond needed him behind the plate. They are used to each other and McCauley knows how to handle the hardthrowing, but sometimes wild Raymond, a big kid who hasn't quite managed to harness all his athletic tools yet.

It worked to perfection. North Carolina mounted one last dramatic threat in the sixth, bringing catcher Chris Sanders, who already had two homers on the day, to the plate representing the tying run. But Raymond mowed him down and Aptos had its win.

Even if the Santa Cruz County kids don't advance to the quarterfinals of this tournament with a win over Harlem, they will cherish this game for years to come.

It was a classic. A Little League classic. And

everyone had a hand in it.
