Lee's 'Merlin' To Make Debut Saturday

Thirty of the hottest racing machines in Northern California will be on the line Saturday. - but all eyes will be on one boat, Bill Lee's spanking new

Merlin, all 67 feet in length and 1,850 square feet of sail, is undoubtedly the star of this year's Ano Nuevo Race.

We have described Merlin in previous columns and we will only say that she should be the

Soquel boat yard.

Lee built the boat to garner "first to finish" honors in the upcoming Transpac. But the Ano Nuevo is a different sort of test for Merlin - and a shakedown race may get rid of der" boat. some of the gremlins that any new racing boat encounters.
The Ano Nuevo Race, spon-

sored by the Monterey Peninsula Yacht Club, kicks off the ocean racing season in the north state. It is regarded as one of the toughest ocean races

hottest boat ever from Lee's in the area. Weather conditions are usually heavy and the 39mile beat from Monterey to Ano Nuevo quickly separates the men from the boys.

If Merlin can go to weather well she could become a "won-

Knowledgeable observers be-lieve Merlin will surprise the yachting world with her ability to point. Everybody agrees she should run and reach like a banshee. Some experts believe the boat will be capable of planing - a feat unheard of in a

large monohull.

There is only one doubt - she may be underwinched for a race such as the Ano Nuevo which features a long, tough beat. Lee set the boat up for the long reaches which occur in the tradewinds en route to Hawaii and the primary winches may not be quite enough for a heavy weather event. And Saturday's crew members could find themselves worn to a frazzle by the time they reach the light off of Ano Nuevo.

There will be four classes: IOR MK III A; IOR MK III B; PHRF A and PHRF B.

IOR A will start at 10 a.m. IOR B goes five minutes later followed by PHRF A and B.

The split in the IOR Division will be made the night before the race. The PHRF A will consist of boats with ratings of zero to 210. The B division will be 211 and above.

A cocktail party will be held the night before at the MPYC clubhouse with a skippers' meeting set for 7 p.m. Friday.
