The one-way loop proposal is the heart of the first stage of a long-range program to clear up traffic circulation problems throughout Santa Cruz.

"This is what we can do immediately without too much cost," City Manager Peter Tedesco explained.

The recommendations, which received unanimous commission support, were prepared by the staff traffic advisory, committee in conjunction with consultant Doug Carmody. This "immediate" program includes the following points:

1. One-way southbound traffic on Pacific from the post office plaza to Front street.

2. One-way northbound traffic on Pacific avenue from Beach street to Pacific-Front, along Front to the post office plaza and along the River street received unanimous commission

3. Restripe Water street for two eastbound lanes and one westbound lane from River to Ocean street.

4. Close off Front at the post office plaza, permitting only free turns onto Water or Pacific. Develop Front between new River street and the plaza as an "on-street" parking lot

with one-hour meters.
5. Add signals at Laurel and Pacific, Laurel and Front, and River and Water. The latter already are in.

6. Meter the River street ex-

tension for four-hour parking. "For a few months — until driving habits change — this will be confusing," Chairman Sam Leask III said.

Parking spaces on both sides of the street would be accessible; delays for double parkers or just plain parkers would be eliminated; and a left turn will be permitted from Soquel avenue, opening a link with Lincoln street and ing a link with Lincoln street and lower Pacific.

"Any kind of turn would go as long as it was southward on Pa-cific and northward on Front," Commissioner Sid Carter sum-

marized.

servations.
"I like it traffic-wise. But how husiness-wise. Has anyone about business-wise. Has anyone contacted Monterey or other tourist cities to see how one-way streets have affected business on the left hand side of the street?"

"Tourists are used to one-way streets now. In 1953, when we got our ears beaten down, this sort of thing was a little new everywhere."

Chief of Polica Geno Pini pointed out the recommended changes would reduce possible "conflicts" at the post office plaza from 27 to 1. That would be thel eft hand turns from Water to Pacific and from Mission to Water.
