## **Jobless** rate up on farm losses

Seasonal declines push county unemployment to 12.1 percent

SANTA CRUZ — Unemployment in Santa Cruz County typically jumps in November due to a seasonal drop in farm jobs, and this year is no exception, pushing the jobless rate up to 12.1 percent from 10.8 percent in October.

"It happens this time of year," said labor analyst Jorge Villalobos, noting unemployment rose from 6.5 percent to 8.3 percent. from October to November in 2008.

There were 99,200 people with jobs, down from 101,200 a year ago, when the economy was bolstered by 2,900 more nonfarm jobs.

Villalobos said "we probably will" see higher jobless figures for December, based on what has happened over the past 19 years.

Unemployment stands at 12.2 percent in California and 9.4 percent in the nation, according to the state Employment Develop-
