Second UCSC College To Be Named For Adlai Stevenson

Memory of the late Adlai Stevenson will be perpetuated on the University of California Santa Cruz campus—the second college to be built here will bear his name.

Regents meeting in San Diego Friday unanimously passed a suggestion of Gov. Edmund G. Brown that the former presidential candidate and U. S. ambassador to the UN be so honored.

In making the announcement, President Clark Kerr and UCSC Chancellor Dean McHenry said Stevenson is universally recognized as a sympathetic, effective and devoted force for world peace. "We can think of no more fitting name for a college within this organization," Kerr said.

"He was a great American," McHenry said, "one of the most articulate men of his time and with his words as well as his example, he inspired a whole generation to stand against indifference and apathy, and to regard politics and diplomacy not as confidence games but as noble callings, worthy of educated men."

Stevenson college will open in the fall of 1966. It will offer its 700 members a liberal arts education, with emphasis on the modern social sciences. The educators declared the unifying theme of the college program will be the relationship of the individual to world-wide society and the forces which shape that relationship.

Provost for Stevenson college is Dr. Charles H. Page, who comes to the post from the chairmanship of the department of sociology and anthropology at Princeton.

Upon notification that the new college will bear Adlai Stevenson's name, Dr. Page said: "Learning that Stevenson is to be the name of the second college at Santa Cruz is splendid news

"Adlai Stevenson combined dedication as ap ublic servant, humane sensitivity, intellectual prowess and world—as well as American citizenship. The qualities of the man, I hope, will become important goals of the college."
