# 'I don't know what happened'

Former chief deputy DA must compete for prosecutor's job

SANTA CRUZ - Jon Hopkins had it all. He was a hotshot trial lawyer — some say the best in the District Attorney's Office. As the No. 2 guy under Art Danner, he was to be the heir apparent whenever Danner moved on.

But that was pre-K.C. — or before Kate Canlis came to

Consider Hopkins' fortunes now: unemployed, running hard among a pack of lawyers wanting the job that once seemed to be all but his.

Danner, within an hour of being appointed to the bench late last month, fired Hopkins to pave the way for Canlis to be appointed as district attorney until an election in March 2000.

"He's definitely an excellent trial attorney," said public defender Jerry Christensen.

"He's comfortable, articulate and persuasive," agreed public defender Larry Biggam, who has tried several murder cases against Hopkins.

Danner appointed him chief deputy of criminal operations in 1986. Four months later, Hopkins resigned to become executive director of the California District Attor-

At the time, the association was working to oust state Supreme Court Chief Justice Rose Bird.

Hopkins' role lasted less than a year. He said he and the organization became political targets because of their campaign against the liberal Bird. He said he also wanted to return to Santa Cruz, where his children lived. Until then, Hopkins had been Danner's right-hand Hopkins said he felt he and the organization would be better off if he resigned.

There were contentions he was about to be fired when he left.

Danner rehired him and he returned to winning cases. He also married Annette Becker, who shared his political ambitions. She later ran unsuccessfully for county supervisor against Mardi Wormhoudt.

Shortly before becoming a judge, Danner said that he felt Hopkins had not completed assigned tasks. Danner said it was out of frustration that he had moved Canlis to a position equal to Hopkins. He said he had hoped that Hopkins' performance would improve because of the competition.

Danner said Canlis was able to finish projects, including setting up a training program, that Hopkins could not. Danner said Canlis was soon outperforming Hopkins as an administrator.

Another reason Hopkins had to go, Danner said, was that he and Canlis did not get along.

Danner said he offered to help Hopkins find a job elsewhere in California but Hopkins never followed through on the leads

Dennis Wong, an assistant district attorney who has taken over some of Hopkins' responsibilities, said it was common knowledge in the office that Hopkins was on his way out, and that "it was a long time coming."

Danner said that until the last day, he remained hopeful Hopkins would accept another job. Danner said he truly felt Canlis was a superior administrator, that it was his responsibility to leave a clear leader in the office. Within an hour of being appointed to the bench, Danner called Hopkins and fired him.

Hopkins defends his administrative abilities by pointing to his performance as a trial lawyer on big cases.

"It's like running a production," he said. "You're not able to do it year in and year out without being a highly skilled administrator."

Hopkins declined to discuss the deteriorating relationships between him, Danner and Canlis.

"I don't want to take that approach. The issue isn't who was Danner's better subordinate. The issue for a D.A. is about leadership."

Hopkins said he looked into other jobs, but stopped because Danner told him he would not seek the judgeship.

Hopkins said Danner offered him a deal to stay in the office, with a demotion, if he agreed not to run for the top job. Hopkins said he took that as a "threat to fire me if I didn't back down from the race."
