

McHenry Says:

Proposition 3 Vital To UC's SC Campus

The early development of the University of California at Santa Cruz is dependent almost entirely on the passage of state bond Proposition 3, according to UCSC Chancellor Dean E. McHenry.

With absolutely no physical plant with which to begin operations, all construction necessary for the opening of classes in September, 1965, must take place during the next three-year period.

Since this timetable for development of an entirely new campus is extremely tight, the failure of Proposition 3 to provide the financing for this project would probably delay the opening of the campus at least one year.

Structures which must be ready on opening day and for which Proposition 3 will provide \$5,605,000 in financing include:

1. Physical Sciences building, housing all physics, chemistry, and (temporarily) biological sciences laboratories as well as classrooms.

2. A Physical Plant building which would also temporarily provide faculty and administrative office space.

3. Dining facilities for the first two residential college units. These facilities would also serve the entire campus until at least 1967. Construction of the residential colleges themselves will be financed by federal and private funds.

4. Site development (roads, walks, building locations) and utility installation, both necessary prior to any construction activity.

Also scheduled to get under way during the next two years is an additional \$7,749,000 worth of projects. This includes planning, working drawings, construction and/or equipment for the following: Humanities building, Library, dining facilities for the third residential college, Engineering building, Auditorium-Gymnasium, and Biological Sciences building, as well as athletic field development.

"Passage of Proposition 3 is vital for the orderly development of public higher education in California," Chancellor McHenry

added. "But for the new campuses of the University, it is critical. Monies simply will not be available for the development of the Santa Cruz campus without this assistance from the state. Since state taxes have about reached the limit of economic feasibility, the only other way to finance the facilities necessary for the continued growth of higher education in California is through the State Construction Bond program — Proposition 3."
