Bahr pointed out that three main points in the brief report will be: the ability to finance a district, needs, and possible dupli-cation of services. If his study shows a recreation district is not feasible, an alternative method for gaining recreation facilities will be offered in the report. method feasible,

The mechanics of forming a district call for the board to decide whether an election should be called to form such an entity, following the completion of the report. A district may be controlled either by the board of supervisors or five trustees elected from the or five trustees elected from the district

The district has a tax limit of 50 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. Boundaries of the proposed district are the same as the fire edi
