Santa Cruz gears up for world-class cycling event Tuesday

THOUSANDS OF FANS EXPECTED TO PACK ROUTE, BOARDWALK FINISH

SANTA CRUZ — Already a bicycling mecca, Santa Cruz will be the center of attention for cycling fans worldwide Tuesday when America's premier race, the Amgen Tour of California, rolls into Surf City.

The legendary 102-year-old Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk will provide a playful backdrop for the finish line of Stage 3, a breathtaking 113-mile journey that will take riders south from San Francisco to the redwood forests of Bonny Doon, where they will then wind their way past UC Santa Cruz to West Cliff Drive. With the sparkling Monterey Bay at their side, the riders will sprint past Lighthouse Point and Steamer Lane on their way to a horseshoe finish over Beach Hill to the front



SANTA CRUZ — Ideal conditions for competitive cycling would include a little bit of sun, a few clouds to keep the heat at bay and not a drop of rain, which is exactly what Mother Nature intends to deliver on Tuesday in time for the Santa Cruz leg of the Amgen Tour of California.

The race day forecast calls for partly cloudy skies with a high of 67, according to meteorologists with the National Weather Service in Monterey.

Today should be cool and cloudy, and Monday carries a strong chance of rain, meteorologist Bob Benjamin said. Most of Monday's rain should be light with brief moments of moderate showers,

"It's not going to be a gully washer or anything," Benjamin said. "But there's

WHERE TO PARK

City officials recommend Amgen spectators park downtown and take shuttles to the beach area because parking near the finish line is expected to be heavily impacted. The following downtown locations will be open for parking for a daily rate of \$5:

- Soquel/Front garage, corner of Soquel Avenue and River Street
- River/Front garage, intersection of River and Front streets
- Cedar/Church garage, bordered by Cedar Street, Walnut Avenue and Church Street
- Locust garage, corner of Cedar and Locust streets

The main parking lot at the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk will be closed to the public. The following parking locations will be open closer to the beach:

- Depot Park lot, Pacific Avenue at Washington Street
- Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk's Leibrandt, Park Place and River lots
- Santa Cruz Municipal Wharf (entrance closes from 2-4:45 p.m.)

More than 120 of the world's best cyclists will ride the tour, including seven-time Tour de France winner Lance Armstrong, George Hincapie, Fabian Cancellara and three-time defending champion Levi Leipheimer. Local fans also will be cheering on Corralitos' own, Ben and Andy Jacques-Maynes.

After rain pelted the riders last February, race organizers moved the event to May this year. The forecast calls for rain Monday with partly cloudy — but dry — skies on Tuesday.

Santa Cruz was selected for the second time to serve as a host city, this time as the finish line for the third stage rather than the second. After downtown served as the finish line last year, the city pitched a beach finish this year to highlight Santa Cruz's iconic coastal

Stage 3 will begin in San Francisco at 11:15 a.m. and end in front of the Boardwalk between 3:20-4 p.m. The route will showcase Northern California's most dramatic coastline from San Francisco's Ocean Beach to Half Moon Bay before taking riders inland for one of three moderate climbs. From Tunitas Creek Road, racers will push again at La Honda Road before cruising back toward the ocean through Pescadero and down Highway 1 to Davenport for the final climb along Bonny Doon Road.


Riders will exit the forest on Empire Grade Road, past the university and down a partly repaved Western Drive to Highway 1 and down Swift Street to the bay. Thousands are expected to line the route and pack in around the finish line. Several roads leading to the finish line at Beach Street and Riverside Avenue will be closed from 8 p.m. Monday to 6 p.m. Tuesday. The race route will be closed from 1:30-4:45 p.m. Tuesday.

2010 AMGEN TOUR OF CALIFORNIA

1: Racers will come south on Highway 1 and turn left onto Bonny Doon Road.

2: After a steep climb past Bonny Doon, the racers will then turn right onto Empire Grade Road.

3: The racers will ride past the western entrance of UCSC and turn right onto Western Drive.


4: At the bottom of the hill on Western Drive, the racers will make a sharp left turn onto Highway 1.

5: Racers will turn right onto Swift Street.

6: Racers will then turn left onto West Cliff Drive and ride for 3 miles along the Santa Cruz coastline.

7: At the wharf, the racers will turn left onto Pacific Avenue, then right onto Second Street and a quick left onto Front Street and right onto Third Street.

8: The racers will finish up with a right onto Cliff Street and a left onto Beach Street


