School awarded for signature practices

Happy Valley Elementary stresses technology and parent involvement

SANTA CRUZ » Inside a classroom at Happy Valley Elementary School, music teacher Ket Conway leads 17 third-graders through their ukulele lesson, playing The Beatles' "Octo-pus's Garden."

The students strum away at their instruments, singing along to the song and reading notes off of music sheets. The instruments and Conway's job are funded in large part by funds raised by parents of the 130 students at the school. Parents are also responsible for other music programs, the art programs, the iPads, laptops and other pieces of technology at the school.

'Those programs would be nonexistent if our parents hance learning. didn't raise that money," said

The single elementary school district was one of four in the county to named by the state a California Distinguished School for 2014. Schools qualify for the award by meeting an academic performance criteria. Once they qualify, an application is submitted by the school outlining, among other things, two signature practices implemented to help students learn.

'I think that for the teachers and people on the ground and parents, it's a really nice accolade and recognition to have and to be recognized for the job that you worked so hard at each and every day," McKinny said.

Happy Valley, which is celebrating its 150th year, listed its two signature practices as parent involvement and implementing technology to en-

Technology is integrated into every grade level to varying degrees. Firstgraders use iPads to create picture boards and books. Second-graders learn to record videos. Each teacher has a school issued laptop to create projects and presentations. Each classroom regularly visits the school's computer lab to work on projects.

McKinny emphasized the technology aspect wouldn't be possible without the help of parents. Parents raise \$100,000 ects by students and out-

grounds crews. In Bria Nathan's secondgrade class, students earn points for behavior and grades that are updated on a website parents can access. Parents can even send congratulatory messages to kids that appear on a screen inside Nathan's classroom. She operates a website for her classroom where she creates blog entries, posts video proj-
