Watsonville planners OK new motel permit

WASONVILLE — Maybe two permit is what the Comfort Suites motel eeds to get off the ground.

Deviopers of the Comfort Suites motel roject at Green Valley Road, just o' Highway 1, had let their previos use permit expire and had failed seek an extension. So Monday nint they were back at the Plannig Commission, asking for a new permit.

The got it.

The roject is one of three motels being ranned for a two-mile stretch of Higway 1, which continues to trouble some planning commissions and council members. An econonc viability study commissioned by two of the developers showecWatsonville could only support on new motel of about 100 rooms.

On te drawing boards are three motelsof nearly 300 rooms.

Despe a pending change in their partnerhip, the Comfort Suites developer appear bound and determine to go ahead with their 78-room totel, restaurant and conference acility.

The Comfort Suites project is closest to actual construction, because it has already cleared design review — the last planning hurdle. The new permit won't affect its design review status.

But that hasn't dissuaded the other projects. Developers of a Ramada Inn at West Beach Street and Lee Road, and a 100-room motel at the freeway west of Airport Boulevard are also gearing up to build this spring. They've each received goaheads from the City Council recently, but still need to pass design review.

Planning Commission Chairman Nat Bua asked the Comfort Suites representative, John Fry, about the economic viability of the project.

"It's a horse race and whoever ... pours the first foundation will win," said Fry. "I wouldn't want to be second."

"Or third," added Bua.

Asked by Planning Commissioner Tony Campos if the Comfort Suites project is in financial trouble, Fry said, "There are a lot of rumors, and like most rumors there's some truth to them.

"There's been a change in the

partnership, with one group trying to buy out the other," he said. "It's a question of which of two groups will build it. But it will be built."

The Comfort Suites project was originally intended as an 83-room motel, but it has been changed to 78 suite-type rooms.

The project is among several required to contribute to a new freeway on-ramp at Green Valley Road. Fry said he's not sure when Caltrans intends to build the freeway access.

In another matter, the Planning Commission again delayed hearing a rezoning request for the Starlite Drive-in, which the Pajaro Valley School District wants to use for a new elementary school.

Property owner Henry Garcia wants to increase the residential zoning from medium- to high-density. The Planning Department staff opposes the move, because of the school district's interest in the land and because the rezoning would increase the population by 43 percent.

Monday night, in a letter to the commission, Garcia asked for a delay in the matter. He has postponed the issue several other times as well.
