## Landlords unveil mall plans SANTA CRUZ — Plans have been subdemolished, has told city officials he is about the subdemolished of the

SANTA CRUZ — Plans have been subnitted for a five-story building at the top of the Pacific Garden Mall that would house tookshop Santa Cruz and two floors of apart-

The plans are first to be turned in for eplacements of buildings destroyed in the oct. 17 earthquake. The former two-story, urn-of-the-century brick building that loused the book store was demolished after

sustained major damage.

Property owner Ron Lau's plans call for wo new buildings, one where the former uilding stood, and a second on the parking be behind. One of the Phoenix pavilions currently stands on the lot.

Lau's building, designed by Santa Cruz rchitect Dale Olsen, must be approved by he city Zoning Board and City Council.

Owners of several other buildings are movng forward with plans. The city Planning epartment has received plans for building epairs and plans for supporting walls in dvance of repairs.

The owner of the Cooper House, which was

demolished, has told city officials he is about ready to submit plans for his property, but none had been received by Wednesday. Owner Jay Paul could not be reached for comment.

City Building Official Dick Stuebendorff said "an extensive shoring plan" has been received for the old County Bank building at Pacific Avenue and Cooper Street.

Plans have been received for a major repair and remodel of 1207 Pacific Ave., which formerly housed Discount Records. A brick wall from the Hihn Building next door collapsed through its roof, causing extensive damage.

Stuebendorff said he has seen preliminary shoring plans for the Palomar Hotel. Owner David Kimmel said earlier this month he wants to move ahead as quickly as possible.

The other downtown residential hotel, the St. George, is still a big question mark. Lisa Bullen, property manager for owner Barry Swenson, said the company still plans to tear the building down.
