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## City balks at paying 2/28/4/ collection fees to county

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It's not open rebellion yet, but the Watsonville City Council is wavering on paying the charges the county has imposed for collection of property taxes and booking people arrested in Watsonville into County Jail.

Finance Director Terry Stigall told the council at its Tuesday night meeting that he hadn't yet paid the \$171,383 the county is demanding from the city and that he was going to meet with the finance directors from the other cities in Santa Cruz County to talk about the charges.

The county decided last fall to impose the fees as a way to balance its own budget in the face of state cutbacks. The state gave counties the right to charge cities, school districts and other jurisdictions for property-tax collection and other services the counties had performed for free.

Watsonville is charged \$70.99 per person for the booking, or about \$1,400 a month, Stigall said. The property-tax collection fees for the year are \$56,146 for the city and \$11,311 for the redevelopment project area in the city.

The council has already decided not to pay the \$11,311, basing its decision on the city attorney's opinion that the law doesn't specify that the county can charge redevelopment agencies.

"I don't think we should pay the bill blindly," said Councilwoman Betty Murphy.

Noting that the school districts See FEES page 2 ▶

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and Cabrillo College are refusing to pay their bills, Murphy said, "the county must be aware that some of us are having problems with it." She said the county already gets 23 percent of the property taxes in the city.

Councilman Lowell Hurst questioned the cost of the booking fee and Councilman Oscar Rios asked if there was any way to avoid booking so many people.

Police Chief Terry Medina, call-

Watsonules - Politics & bort. ing the law that allows counties to charge for booking "ill-conceived" and blatantly unfair to the cities and the public, which already pays taxes to the county, said there wasn't. Even people who just get a ticket are "booked" at some point in the court process.

> "I will not mete out justice in terms of how much a booking fee costs if it's something that directly affects someone's safety," he said.

The council voted unanimously to hold off paying the bills until Stigall has had a chance to meet with the other cities.
