

# Siemering New Cabrillo Athletic Director

## Will Coach Football Team; May Still Lead 1959 Cards

Cabrillo college yesterday announced the selection of Larry Siemering, Santa Cruz high school football coach, as its new athletic director.

Siemering, who led the Cardinals to two league championships during his three-year tenure, will coach the new junior college football team when it takes to the field for the first time in 1960.

His departure may not be as disastrous as it first sounds for the local high school. Athletic Director Roger Baer said it is quite possible Siemering would continue to coach the high school football team during the coming season.

Baer said it would prove extremely difficult for the Cardinals to locate a top-flight football coach at this late date for the coming campaign.

"It would be difficult at any time to replace a man of Siemering's stature," Baer said, "but if it meets with the approval of the high school and college boards I will recommend that he coach the Cardinals this coming season."

Baer pointed out that the junior college, now temporarily located at Watsonville high school, will field no team this season and would not conflict with Siemering coaching Santa Cruz high.

Santa Cruz Superintendent Dr. Lawrence Magee said he thought it was an excellent idea, and would recommend it to the board as the solution to a difficult problem.

Siemering's new job will find him organizing the physical education and athletic program at Cabrillo. "It will be a big and challenging job," the silver-thatched mentor said today, "but I believe Cabrillo will prove to be one of the state's finest junior colleges in the future."

He said he is sorry to be leaving Santa Cruz high, but considered the new position a definite advancement. He also indicated that he would consider coaching the high school team in the coming season if it met with the approval of Cabrillo President Dr. Robert Swenson and the college trustees.

A veteran of high school, college and professional coaching, Siemering will be making his first venture at the junior college level.

The former University of San Francisco All-American began his high school career at Manteca high school. At one time he had

### HORSES DIE

**AFTER HEAD-ON COLLISION**  
Stanton, Del. (AP)—A head-on collision killed two horses taking warmup runs at Delaware Park Tuesday just before the seventh race. Both jockeys escaped serious injury.

## Rush Blanks Giants, 3-0; Five-Hitter

Milwaukee (AP)—Youth supposedly will be served, but the Milwaukee Braves are finding it better to call upon old pros in the National League pennant race.

Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney pushed the right button Tuesday night, switching to veteran Bob Rush as his pitcher. Rush blanked the San Francisco Giants 3-0 to have the Braves back into a 2. game lead.

After watching a couple of his young prizes, Joey Jay and Juan Pizarro, get clobbered for 14 hits in an 11-2 loss Monday night, Haney decided that was enough. So it was Rush instead of sophomore Carl Willey in the second game of the important series.

Rush, a 34-year-old right-hander in his 12th season in the NL, shut out the Giants on five hits and didn't allow a runner to reach second base.

Rush, relegated this season to a job of long relief roles for the most part, made the most of his first start since May 10.

He struck out eight and didn't walk a batter while going the route for the first time this year and picking up his fourth victory without defeat.

"I had my control all the way, getting the fast curve over and putting the fast ball where I wanted it," Rush said. "I had to bear down all the way, but I felt surprisingly strong at the finish. That fast ball did it for me. I was hitting those corners, inside, outside, high and low. They were swinging and not getting a good piece of the ball."

Veteran third baseman Eddie Mathews supplied the only run Rush needed against the Giants by lofting a 400-foot drive into the bleachers in right center for his 17th homer. San Francisco starter Stu Miller, another noted reliever, surrendered two more runs to supply a Milwaukee cushion in the fifth.

The Giants' fast-balling Jack Sanford goes against Bob Buhl or Carleton Willey tonight. Jack, who has whipped the Braves 8-5 and lost to them 8-1, is seeking his seventh triumph against five losses.

## Brown, Rosi Knock Heads

### 'Old Bones' Favored, 3-1, In Lightweight Title Bout

Washington (AP)—"Fighting is my business," says lightweight champion Joe Brown. To prove his point, the 33-year-old ruler risks his crown for the seventh time when he takes on dangerous Paolo Rosi at Uline Arena tonight.

The 15-rounder will be telecast on Channel 8 starting at 7 p.m.

Commissions don't have to worry about making Old Bones from Houston live up to the six months defense rule.

The aging but still slick champ is 'way ahead of schedule.

This could be the toughest of all his defenses of the crown he won from Wallace (Bud) Smith nearly three years ago. Rosi, a bony, wide-shouldered boxer-puncher, probably is the hardest hitter among the contenders.

The 31-year-old Italian-born New Yorker has run up an unbeaten streak of nine in the last two years. Although he is the No. 3 contender, he still is a hungry fighter. Paolo hasn't had too many big paydays since he started fighting for cash eight years ago in Italy.

"This is my big chance," said Paolo. "I got to give it all I have. Brown is a very good fighter. But I am faster and younger than he is and I think I can hit just as hard. He go down or I go down."

The odds-makers figure Rosi will be the one to hit the deck. They have made the champion a 3-1 favorite.

Rosi knocked out Frankie Ryff in the third round of his last start on April 10. His record is 31-4-1 including 13 knockouts, most of them scored with a slashing left hook.

Soft tissue over his jutting brows make Rosi vulnerable to cuts. You can be sure Brown will be stabbing away at the target.

Brown, a potent left-hooker himself, outpointed Johnny Busso in his last outing, a 15-round title defense at Houston, Feb. 11.

He has 32 kayos to his credit in his 72-16-9 record.

The champ's only loss in his last 20 fights was a non-title ten rounder to Busso on Nov. 5.

A crowd of 6000 may pay around \$50,000 at the Uline gate. Network television ABC will add \$40,000 to the pot. A 100-mile area around Washington will be blacked out.

Brown will collect 40 per cent and Rosi 20 per cent of everything.

a winning streak of 38 games.

In 1942, Siemering moved to Stockton college and the College of the Pacific as line coach under the "grand old man of football," Amos Alonzo Stagg. He remained in this capacity until taking over as head coach at COP in 1947.

Led by Eddie LeBaron, Siemering's teams won 10 and lost one in both 1947 and '48, and compiled a perfect season of 11 straight the following year. He completed his coaching career at Stockton in 1950 with a 7-2-1 mark.

Following his stay at COP, Siemering coached a single season at Arizona State (Tempe) and then entered the pro ranks as line coach for the Washington Redskins.

In 1954 he became head coach of the Calgary Stampeders, a Canadian professional team.

After a season out of football, Siemering came to Santa Cruz high school. His three-year record of 20 wins, six losses and a tie made the Cardinals a power among northern California prep teams.

His 1958 squad was rated best in north state as it compiled a perfect record of nine victories. In 1956 he brought Santa Cruz its first CCAL championship in 13 years as the team won four of its league games and finished the season with a 4-4-1 mark. The following year Santa Cruz won seven and lost two, but finished second to Salinas.

Siemering is known as one of the nation's finest offensive coaches, and he is generally credited with being the inventor of the belly series now used by many high schools, college and pro teams throughout the nation.
