"I have also been asked about artesian wells and coastal streams. There has been some talk about a well in Scotts Valley which flows artesially at the rate of 36 gallons per minute. This would be less than one tenth of the requirement for a single irrigated farm of 50 to 60 acres, and would literally be a meaningless 'drop in the bucket' for our city supply. There has been no indication that this would be a There has been no indication whatever that this would be a major source of supply. Scotts Valley itself needs water, and whatever that major source of supply. Scotts Valley itself needs water, and even they have apparently made no effort whatever to tap this trickle as a significant source of supply. In addition, this water has been found to be highly cor-

"We now use water directly om three coastal streams. from three coastal streams. These streams produce plenty of water when we need it least and virtually none when we need it most, during the dry season. To relieve our situation at all, this water would have to be impounded by means of dams, just as we are proposing at Newell Creek. The difference is that a dam on the largest of these coastal streams would produce only a small

largest of these coastal streams would produce only a small fraction as much water, per year, as one at Newell Creek.

"The hills and other terrain features around Newell Creek are such that costs of a dam and reservoir there are low. The cost of the earthfill dam at Newell creek is only \$1,400,000. The rest of the cost is for items such as pipelines and particulary for the treatment plant (nearly \$2,000,000) which the state department of public health insists on, even for our present water supply.

"I have been asked, just a few

"I have been asked, just a few times, if we couldn't relieve our present critical situation by cut-ting off water service to the sub-urban areas. We have not added areas. We have not added any new services outside the city limits for many, many years. Once such service has been established. however, it can not be cut off. The law does not permit it. These

The law does not permit it. These suburban areas pay substantially more for the same water than we do here in the city. They pay us well for their water, as they will for the proposed improvements, but we couldn't cut off their service if we wanted to.

"We have studied all these proposals and other. We have had the services of professional consultants, engineers, and experts in the field. Members of the city council and water commission are water users, just like anyone else, and have unanimously recommended the Newell creek project, and the financing by longterm revenue bonds, as being much the most economical methers." much the most economical method for all of us."

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
