Hloating on begonias Begonia Festiva

Nautical Parade's flowery boats draw crowd to Soquel Creek

CAPITOLA — Brightly colored begonia-covered boats drew a standing room-only crowd to the banks of Soquel Creek again this year for the 60th annual Capitola Begonia Festival Nautical Parade.

The crowd cheered the light-hearted, fanciful floats as they drifted down the river on a sunny afternoon. At least

two carried musicians whose songs added to the fun. Celebrity appearances included "Elvis," who manned one float, and festival sponsor Ronald McDonald in a shiny white row boat.

Parties were held in several riverfront yards and kayakers and others joined the floats on the water.

Longtime contestant Dan Finkel captured first place in the parade contest, along with Will and Caroline Mill-

er, with a float titled "Capitola Water Follies: Begonia Belle," in honor of the 1952 festival.


Finkel repeated a float his dad had made, of a historic paddle wheel boat, said Laurie Hill, parade chairwoman.

The parade theme was "My Favorite Year," and entrants were asked to pattern their float after a theme of a previous parade, Hill said.

She said history was quite possibly made by Riverview Rascals, who claimed the tallest float ever with

their "Hot Air Balloon" creation.
"It was a great sunny day for a parade," Hill said. "The trestle, bridge, creek path and lagoon were packed with spectators. I want to give thanks to all the float builders and volunteers who made this festival such a success.'

Bill Gibson of Soquel was one of those spectators, along with his girlfriend, Dana Farquhar. He said he tries to make it down each year.

"I think it's an awesome, special thing we do here," he said. "It's fun and I love that they shut down Stockton Avenue."

Becky Mikosz of San Jose said she has come to the festival for the past few years.

"I like the small-town feel of this; I think it's good for the village, people come from all over," she said.

Volunteers worked on floats until late Saturday night, a parade announcer said. She said making a float is a great team-building exercise.

The parade is limited to 10 barges, and the parade organizers supply the basic wooden platform. The bulbs are grown in Marina and donated by Golden State Bulb Growers Association.

From the 1930s to the 1970s, approximately 90 percent of the world's begonias came from the former Brown Bulb Ranch in the area were Capitola Mall now stands, according to the festival website.

The nautical parade has its roots with a local swim teacher, Peggy Matthews, who staged the Capitola Water Follies every fall to showcase her swimmers. Matthews noticed begonia flowers going to waste on a ranch, as growers were interested only in propagating bulbs.


In 1951, Matthews was given permission to pick as many flowers as she wanted and that year's follies featured paddle boards decorated with begonias. The next year was the first year of actual "floats." Even though the real Capitola Begonia Festival was not official until 1954, organizers say they have always used 1952 as the starting date.

The all-volunteer festival continues today with a 6 a.m. fishing derby on the wharf, children's art and a "Hoops for Everyone" teaching and expo from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Esplanade Park, and row boat races at 1 p.m. along Soquel Creek.
