## Glenn Kendali **Leave City Post** To Seek Degree

Assistant City Manager Glenn Rendall announced today he resign early in September to seek a master's degree in public administration at UCLA.

City hall has taken steps to line up a successor to Kendall, who received word two days ago his UCLA application had been accepted. He will leave Santa Cruz sometime before September 12, registration date.

Half a dozen applications for the post are on file at present, and the city will, advertise for additional qualified candidates. Kendall's successor will be chosen from applicants who appear at an oral exam August 13 before the civil service commission and other examiners, to be appointed, who will comprise a special board.

No written test is necessary inasmuch as the position is at the "department head" level and calls for a person with established qualifications.

The job—termed "assistant city manager" by this newspaper for purposes of brevity and identification — actually covers three functions and titles: administrative assistant to the city manager, budget director and personnel director.

He had an impressive academic and professional background for a young man, including a bachelor's degree in political science, service as a sergeant in the marine corps, two years on the Chico police force and an internship with the Coro foundation in San Francisco.

The Coro foundation provides graduate internships in public administration for promising students of government.

His father, Glenn Kendall Sr., is president of Chico State college, where Kendall earned his degree. Other posts held at one time or another by the senior Kendall include dean of education and psychology at San Francisco State college, superintendent of schools for the Tennessee Valley Authority and educational services chief for the U.S. Immigraion and Naturalization service.

While he is a graduate of Chico, Kendall also has studied as an undergraduate at Stanford university and the University of

Kendall also has studied as an undergraduate at Stanford university and the University of Maine. He was born in Smith's Grove, Ky., in 1928 and spent nearly every year of his grammar and high school career in a different locality as his father's work took the family to various parts of the U.S.

The date of his departure will be dictated in part by how speedily a replacement can be selected and broken in. Once in Los Angeles, Kendall will seek a job to meet grocery and rent bills for the full year it will take to complete his course.

Social and charitable activities have taken much of his free time in Santa Cruz. He is assistant scoutmaster of Boy Scout troop 94, a member of the Toastmasters, Kiwanis and the junior chamber of commerce and has assisted community chest fund-raising.

He will seek a city manager-ship after earning his degree and eventually will teach public ad-ministration at the college level, Kendall said.
