

# UC Students Plan To March To Regents' Meeting Today

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Regents of the University of California quietly opened their two-day meeting this morning at UCSC with a routine progress report on long-range development of the Santa Cruz campus.

This afternoon, however, students plan a "peaceful non-violent march" from the Stevenson-Cowell College areas to the Crown College courtyard near the dining commons where the Regents' sessions are being conducted.

At this afternoon's meeting of the Regents' committee on educational policy, Ho Nguyen, a Vietnam-born student at Stevenson College, is scheduled to present several petitions, including one in support of the proposed Malcolm X college.

He also is expected to ask Regents to support the boycott against California table grapes and rescind the Regents' earlier action restricting the appearance of Black Panther Eldridge Cleaver at UC Berkeley.

Today the Associated Press reported that an aide to Governor Reagan said that the Regents "probably will consider new action" against Cleaver's lecturing at the Berkeley campus.

Alex Sheriffs, Reagan's educational specialist, said, "I'm fairly sure there will be proposals."

The Regents voted 10 to 8 last month to limit

Cleaver or any other guest lecturer to one appearance in a UC course given for credit. University administrators subsequently deleted academic credit for the experimental course in which Cleaver already has appeared as a lecturer.

Thus, the AP reported, "Cleaver could give his scheduled 10 lectures in the class and could technically meet the Regents' ruling on guest lecturers."

Governor Reagan, who is scheduled to take part in the Regents' general session tomorrow afternoon, has said Cleaver should not be allowed any formal class appearances at the university.

During this morning's report on Santa Cruz campus development, the Regents' committee on grounds and buildings viewed a series of slides on development plans through the turn of the century when some 27,500 students are expected.

The report stressed proposals for over-all land use, development of streets and parking and grouping of individual colleges around the academic core.

The report was given by Ernest Kump, consulting architect, and other campus planners.

Chancellor Dean E. McHenry told the committee that care has been taken to "preserve the natural assets of the area" and at the same time to achieve diversity.
