WATER RATIONING NOW IN EFFECT!



The City Council has passed an emergency ordinance, effective immediately, placing limits on water usage for all water customers. Because you are billed every two months, the chart shows the amount of water allowed for the two month period. One month's allotment would be half the cubic feet shown.

Your water bills are charged by cubic feet of water used in increments of 100 cubic ft.

7½ gallons 1 cubic ft. 100 cubic ft. 750 gallons

Amount of water for two months:

(approx. 112 gallons per day per household) 900 cubic ft. bi-monthly 1 person (approx. 187 gallons per day per household) 2 persons (approx. 249 gallons per day per household) 2000 3 persons (approx. 299 gallons per day per household) 2400 4 persons Over 4 persons: 400 cubic ft. bi-monthly (approx. 50 additional gallons per person per each additional person day)

The Water Department will be sending out mailings to all water customers giving more

details of the water rationing plan and water conservation.

BICYCLE THEFTS ON THE INCREASE

The Santa Cruz City Police Department warns that the problem of bicycle thefts is almost epidemic in Santa Cruz. Many of the 33 bicycles stolen in January were left unlocked in front or back yards, on sidewalks or at school. There is no substitute for keeping your bicycle in your sight, but having and using a good hardened chain and lock is the next best thing. Remember also that bicycle licensing is a good method of helping the police to identify stolen bikes. Licenses are available at any of the Santa Cruz Fire Departments and at bicycle shops in Santa Cruz. GARBAGE AND TRASH COLLECTION

City Sanitation crews are now setting emptied cans back of the sidewalks onto private property and away from the curbs, where they were placed formerly, to comply with City Council efforts to keep the streets more sightly. Customers are still required to place their garbage containers at the curbs by early morning of the day of pick-up and to remove the cans from public view as soon as possible after they are emptied. HOUSING FUNDS AVAILABLE

Housing Repair Funds: The City's Elderly Housing Rehabilitation Grant Program provides grants of up to \$3,500 to low and moderate-income senior homeowners for repairs such as roofing, electrical, wiring, plumbing, insulation, steps, porches, painting and heating. Forty houses have been repaired since the program started, and there are funds available to accept new applicants.

Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program: The City's loan program provides for loans of up to \$7,500 to low and moderate income homeowners for the same kind of repairs as listed above for seniors. The loans, which are provided to owners unable to repay monthly, are repaid when the property sells or title transfers. The interest rate is 5% per year on the loan amount.
