

The city is required to keep the channel clear for spawning runs from October through May under terms prescribed in the agreement accepting control from the army corps of engineers. Tidal action causes silting in the creek channel. Almost daily attention is required by city crews to keep abreast of the human-caused damage to other portions of the flood control system, control weeds and willows, and keep the ma-chinery in operating order.
