Board Backs Library Lease If Bonds Approved

Supervisors yesterday informally said they would take a long-term "lease" on use of new city library buildings, if bonds are approved by voters June 2.

The board indicated it will not allow the city to veto location or size of county libraries, or cast any county veto on city library projects. Robert Burton abstained on the vote.

The city had asked the board for a statement on both proposals. City officials were particularly worried that a one-year clause in a contract for county support would leave them holding the bag on library bonds.

Though the county is not involved in the June 2 issue, it agreed to pay a proportionate share for county residents' use of the libraries, in the form of a lease-type agreement.

A longer "lease" guarantee is needed to assure the arrangement would last, the board of supervisors agreed.

Burton, however, said he would not vote on the matter, even as an indication, until he has actually seen the contract with the city.

In other action, supervisors considered these matters:

TOUR—The board decided to tour the new East Cliff sewage disposal plant tomorrow afternoon. The plant is using a new incineration sewage treatment method, the first in California. Supervisors are directors of the East Cliff district.

HIGHWAY 17 — Unclassified zoning for Highway 17 from Vine Hill road to the summit, and from the Santa Cruz city limits to one-half mile north of Sims road was unanimously adopted,

and passed to second reading as an ordinance.

Planning Director Bert Muhly told the board that the removal of strip commercial zoning will allow better control of traffic flow on the dangerous sections of the highway.

LIVE OAK—Apartment zoning for the west side of Eldorado avenue and the north side of Brommer street, north and west of both streets, was approved.

MEETING—The board agreed to a joint city-county meeting on June 4. Though no specific reason for the meeting was given, board members indicated they may discuss the two proposed shopping centers in Live Oak.

APPOINT—I. L. Koppell and Willard Lee Pope were reappointed to the hospital advisory board, while Forrest G. Murdock was reappointed to the county board of zoning adjustment.

PROPERTY — The board agreed to sell tax deeded property to the San Lorenzo Valley county water district in Redwood Park subdivision. Two parcels are involved.

BONNY DOON — Agricultural zoning with a 2½-acre minimum was approved for land on both sides of Empire Grade road, south of Ice Cream grade intersection.

APPEAL—The appeal of Bear Creek Estate subdivision from a sewage inspection limitation on a use permit was continued another week. The issue is scheduled for hearing before the state water pollution control board, Attorney Ray Scott said.

UNIVERSITY—A joint public hearing for adoption of the general plan for the University of California environs will be held June 18 at 8 p.m. in the city council chambers. Both city and county planning commissions have approved the plan.
