According to Pete, the main function of the Peace corps in Ghana is to provide secondary school teachers for the former British colony. There are 50 already there, with the 84 now in training to be added to the force. The official language still is English, he noted, and the schools are being run on the European plan. However, the Peace corps personnel also will receive intensive training in one of the basic Ghana languages, Twi.

He will be responsible for the well-being and performance of the volunteers.
