The agency is spearheading an attempt to secure corps approval of construction plans for the levee banks. The cost of planting trees and groundcover, estimated at \$100,000, would be paid by the agency through available credits.

ed for Santa Cruz. Col. Boerger, who arrived in Santa Cruz Monday evening and returned to San Francisco this afternoon, lunched today with agency representatives.
