The event, sponsored by the city, will run from 9 a.m.

p.m.

Police will barricade streets around a five-block area that en-compasses most of the neighborhood while participants pick up trash. clip weeds and paint over graffiti.

Mayor, council to participate Mayor Don Lane and other city council members are expected to pitch in. Firefighters will barbecue food for participants.

Lucky and Safeway supermarkets have donated food. Local hardware and paint stores have donated other supplies.

So far, about 50 people have gned up — from students to signed up — from students to retired people to city employees donating their weekend time

"Everybody seems really excit-ed about it," said organizer Linda Garner. "It's been long overdue." Garner is Santa Cruz's housing

code enforcement officer.

Refurbishing Beach Flats She was hired this year as part of a city council push to refurbish the Beach Flats area, a neighbor-hood near the Beach Boardwalk amusement park that in recent years has been plagued by gang activity, prostitution and drug sales.

Many Beach Flats residents are arrivals from Mexico and recent Central America who are regularly intimidated by drug gangs, and at the same time forced by eco-nomic hardship to live in poorly maintained housing.

"We have a lot of people down there who are nice families trying to keep their units clean," said Garner. "But it is difficult.

"We want to work together and show that the city cares."
