

# JUNE 1985: Travelers welcome a place to rest, but famed Beach Boys are turned away

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The Sentinel is celebrating its 150th year in 2006 by reaching into our archives to republish some of the noteworthy stories and happenings of the past. The following includes notable events from June 1985.

■ The Santa Cruz Hostel, located at Mission Hill Jr. High School, opened. The hostel included mattresses, hot showers, free coffee or tea and blankets. The cost was \$5 for American Youth Hostel or International Hostel Federation members and \$8 for any-

one else.

■ An eight-month-long, \$210,000 underground utility project in Capitola Village was completed.

■ The first state-sponsored Junior Lifeguard program in Santa Cruz County was started.

■ Gail Stevens, a 42-year-old grandmother, beat a 27-year-old opponent for Cabrillo College student body president.

■ A protester accused of destroying copies of Penthouse magazine during a demonstration at Warehouse Liquors

6-4-06  
 was placed on six months probation.

■ Cesar Chavez marched with 400 members of the United Farm Workers in Pajaro Valley and Watsonville. The point of the march was to sensitize

farmworkers to the threat of growers bringing in labor contractors.

■ The Beach Boys were denied a request to play a free concert on the Main Beach over the Fourth of July weekend because, said city officials, it was already one of the most congested weekends of the year.

■ The Santa Cruz City Council made it illegal for residents to dump volatile materials, including petroleum distillates such as gasoline and alcohol, in trash cans collected by city workers.

■ Fifty four people, including two former Santa Cruz mayors (Burt Muhly and Bruce VanAllen) were arrested during two days of protest over U.S. policies in Central America.

■ Twenty eight deaths or stillbirths out of 87 cases of sickness were found to be linked to contaminated cheeses, state health officials said.

■ Jalisco cheese products were taken off the shelf of all Santa Cruz stores and recalled all over California as well as in Arizona and Texas.
