
'Historic' image has whimsical roots

(It was all very similar to the "history" we used to get at Frontier Village in San Jose, for example.) The buildings were demolished by the state in 1955.

Mail did come into Santa Cruz County via horseback in the 1850s, but it had nothing to do with the Pony Express. Finally, the first outside telegraph connection between Santa Cruz and San Francisco was

completed, via Watsonville, in February, 1862.
