

Board Okays Greyhound Rock Upkeep

Board of Supervisors Chairman Francis Silliman broke a 2-2 deadlock to pass a resolution this morning assuring that the county will assume maintenance responsibilities when the state wildlife board develops the Greyhound rock property north of Davenport into an access area for fishermen.

The state board wants a commitment from the county before going ahead with plans to purchase the property from the Gianone family.

Casting affirmative votes to the motion initiated by Supervisor Walter G. Merrill were Supervisor Lewis Nelson, Silliman and Merrill.

"No" votes were made by Supervisors Hulda McLean and Vincent Locatelli.

Mrs. McLean explained she was for the plan but wanted more information concerning upkeep costs before a commitment is made. The county is not justified in spending a great deal of money for a fishing retreat, she argued.

Gaining a cool reception by board members was a motion she made to approve the plan on the condition the maintenance costs do not exceed income.
