
SANTA CRUZ YESTERDAYS

Santa Cruz!

For on that memorable day the President of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, was a guest of the city. On a nationwide tour, he included both Santa Cruz and the Big Trees in his itinerary.

Today's picture from yester-years, taken in the heart of the downtown area, shows the national chief executive addressing a gathering of the citizenry. He is speaking from the carriage which had transported him up Pacific avenue from the Southern Pacific

reception committee.

The spot is near the Court House, opposite Cooper street.

Historical Highlight

According to accounts of the memorable occasion it was, and still remains, one of the lights of the colorful past of this community.

"It will always occupy a place in the most historical events of our city," said an account of the event in the columns of the old Morning Sentinel.

Incidentally, one other United States President, Benjamin Harrison, had earlier been here.

At an early hour on the day of President Roosevelt's visit, the populace began to gather. When the train arrived at 9:45 a.m. the President and party were escorted to carriages. In the Presied to carriages. In the President's carriage, drawn by two black horses driven by John Werner, were also Roosevelt's secretary, Mayor Clark and J. W. Linscott.

Preceded by the Naval Re-serves and Hastings' band, the procession moved over part of Beach Hill and proceeded up Pacific avenue, which was crowded. Flags fluttered in the breeze, ident's visit to the grove.

"I am to visit the grove of the great trees, and I wish to congratulate you, people of California, because of this region, and to congratulate all on what you have done to preserve the trees. Cut down giants and you cannot take their place."
