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## Trustees pick library site

It may be a Pyrrhic victory, but the Santa Cruz city-county library trustees Monday picked two sites for libraries Live Oak and Boulder Creek.

But with the anticipated passage of Prop. 13 — the Jarvis-Gann tax initiative on Tuesday — the long-planned branch libraries may never be built in the two communities.

The library board settled on a primary site on the northeast corner of Brommer Street and 30th Avenue, and a secondary site at the southwest corner of Capitola Road and 30th Avenues, in Live Oak.

The unanimous vote was a surprise to the representa-tives of the Live Oak Senior Center who had long lobbied for a library to be built on a one-acre site adjacent to their center on Capitola Road be-tween 17th Avenue and Avenue and Chanticleer Avenue.

which The alternate site, sits atop a small bluff and would be difficult to develop of traffic because topography problems, is 92,600 square feet in size and carries a price tag of \$70,000, the public works department estimates.

By comparison, the site next to the senior center is 47,000 square feet, and carries a price tag of \$95,000.

The land is part of a package now leased by the senior center through the Live Oak school district, from a private owner.

Center representatives, led by Mrs. Elena Baskin, and supported by the Live Oak school district, have argued that the site could also hold a small library that would be easily accessible to the seniors at the center and to the school children attending Live Oak elementary school across the street.

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Ultimately, it was the shared facility approach, especially that of parking, that trustees identified as the main reason for rejecting the 17th Avenue and Capitola Road site.

Trustee Vernon Berlin called the Brommer-30th site "the most centrally located, which doesn't have a problem of shared parking, is on the

bus routes, and is available."
His motion to recommend the site to the county Board of quickly Supervisors was seconded by newly-appointed trustee Sara Bunnett.

Berlin later amended his motion at the request of Eleanor Engstrand and Joseph Wilson, both of whom wanted to see the Capitola Road-30th Avenue site sidered by the supervisors.

"My own feelings," said Mrs. Engstrand, rejecting the senior center site, "is that the site is smaller, more expensive, and does not have

good parking."
