## UCSC Adds 100,000th Book --15th Century Pamphlet

SANTA CRUZ — The University of California at Santa Cruz Monday officially added the 100,000th book to its library, a 15th Century religious tract written by a German monk.

The rare volume, which was

printed at about the same time as the famed Gutenberg Bibles, was donated by Mark Lansburgh, a consultant for U.C.'s Santa Barbara campus library. It has been placed on display at the library here. Scholars are about to start work in translating the book, which is in Latin.

The book was written by a monk in Canons Regular of St. Augustine monastery, Heidelberg, Germany. Dedicated to St. John the Baptist, the book was published in 1489.

The 100-page book is bound in wood, covered with pigskin. Floral designs have been worked into the leather cover.


Each page has 39 lines. Initial letters in main paragraphs are written by hand in red ink, which, library officials said, was a common practice in that era.

Chancellor Dean E. McHenry hailed the library addition as a "milestone" for the university. He said that of the 2,140 colleges and universities in the United States, only 362 of them have more than 100,000 volumes.

Besides being the 100,000th addition to the library, the book is the library's first incunabulum reference, a book printed between 1456 and 1500.

Carl Wensrich, chief of reader services at the library, said work will start soon in translating the book. He said the translation will be placed with the original in the library.

Librarian Donald Clark said it would be difficult to place a monetary value on the book. He said its value is mainly in its age, as a prime example of 1st Century printing.
